At the beginning of the 1966-67 school year, Padua received a new Rector, the third in the school's history. All three accomplished much for the school during their respective administrations.


Back in 1949, when most of the class of '67 were just starting on their journeys through life, Fr. Claude Zabinski, O. F. M. assumed the post of Rector. As we were being guided through infancy, so Fr. Claude guided Padua through its infant pioneer days, trying to form an institution that would flourish and grow strong. For ten years he held his position admirably; not only getting the main building in shape but also overseeing the erection of the gym.


In 1960, Fr. Hyacinth Kulinski, was appointed Rector. By that time, the Class of '67 was passing through what are known as "growing pains". Father Hyacinth, in turn, had to guide the school through its post-pioneer days. It was a difficult task, but slowly Padua was beginning to take shape as an institution with tradition and ideals. During this time, Father saw to it that remodeling work on the interior of the building was begun. This was the point at which the Class of '67 entered the whirlwind of Paduan life, to be helped and guided by Fr. Hyacinth through three years at school.

In our fourth and final year at Padua, we were under the able direction of Fr. Emil Rakowski, O.F.M., who has been stationed at Padua since its formation. To him fell the task of giving us final preparation before we went our respective ways, and of further refining Padua into something even better than before.

Father Emil, a native of Milwaukee was ordained on May 29, 1947. He received his Master of Science degree in Ithaca College. Presently, in addition to his duties as Rector, he teaches Physics and coaches the gym team.








New Rector . . .

New Guardian, Vice Guardian Chosen in 1966







Father Cherubin Drag, OFM

Father Mel Baran, OFM

Father left Racine, Wisconsin to enter the Order in 1950. He was ordained in 1959 and spent two years at Padua before leaving to obtain his M.A. in math at Fordham University. He returned in September 1964 to teach Geometry and Trigonometry to Paduans. Father has always been popular with the students even though he has had to hold down the sometimes trying task of Disciplinarian.

Father Ligouri Mierzwiak, OFM

Father Ligouri came to Padua from Lourdes Retreat House for men in Cedar Lake, Indiana, this past year, and has already become a favorite of Paduans. He was born in Toledo, Ohio, in 1933, and attended St. Francis College. Having been ordained in 1959, he now teaches Latin I and Religion III. In addition to this teaching load, Father also takes on the tasks of Vice-Disciplinarian and Vice Rector.



Father Roland Jaskulski, OFM

Father originally came from Green Bay, Wisconsin and his avid support of the Packers shows that he is proud of it. He entered the Order in 1947, was ordained in 1955, obtained his M.A. in history at St. Bonaventure University, and joined Padua's campus in 1956 as teacher of world and American history. 
Father Knute Knitter, OFM

Father Fidelis is one of the older members of the faculty having been in the Order since 1942. He has various jobs and spare time activities, such as ham radio operation. He teaches Geography, and French, and is manager of the bookstore.





Father Gabriel Rosetti, OFM

Although a native of this area, (he is a neighbor from Shamokin, Pa.), this is his first year at Padua. Before his ordination in 1959, Father was a sergeant in the army. After his ordination, he taught at St. Bonaventure in Sturtevant. This year he teaches Religion 4, English 2—4 and is moderator of the Student Council. Because of his hearty laugh and willingness to help any student Father was readily accepted by all Paduans.

Father Leonard Stunek, OFM

Fr. Leonard was born in Cleveland, Ohio. He entered the Order in 1951, and before coming to Padua this past year, was chaplain at St. Vincent's Hospital in Green Bay, Wisconsin. Besides teaching Latin II, III and French II, Father is advisor to the junior class.





Father Placid Stroik, OFM



Those who played on this year's team can look back with satisfaction, and forward with expectation of an even better season next year.























