# OCTOBER 1979 ALUMNI REUNION NOTES

The second annual reunion of the revitalized Padua Alumni Association took place on October 19, 20, and 21 in Watkins Glen. Once again, we were fortunate to be blessed with excellent weather. Attendance was just slightly below last year's, with around eighty persons being present, although some were only able to participate in one or another of the scheduled activities. (In 1978, around 46 alumni attended; in 1979, around 40 alumni were present.)

The joy of renewing friendships re-established in 1978 among those present at both of the reunions was complemented and strengthened by the pleasure of seeing many new faces at the 1979 reunion. Saturday's activities were centered right at Padua, with the buildings and grounds being open for alumni to walk through. A luncheon was provided by Glen Industries, the sheltered workshop now utilizing the gymnasium building. This was followed by the business meeting, which included a slide presentation by a member of the consulting firm involved in preparing development plans for Watkins Glen.

Much laughter and some nostalgia accompanied the special showing of a movie made about life at Padua in the years just before its closing. A fitting closing to these events was the celebration of the Eucharist by Fr. Austin in the gym.

The evening was reserved for the alumni banquet held at the Glen Motor Inn. Following the delicious dinner, with choices being prime rib or trout, and the "annual picture-taking session", alumni again continued catching up on memories until far into the night.

Sunday morning saw an informal departure by alumni. All in all, the 1979 reunion seemed quieter in some ways, more emotionally intense in others, yet provided the same heartwarming experiences of friendship shared as did the 1978 reunion. It is hoped that alumni will begin planning now to attend the 1980 reunion which will be held this coming summer.

#### 1979 BUSINESS MEETING

The meeting opened at 1:10 pm in the gymnasium cafeteria. There was a review of the status of the association, with particular focus on the newsletters and treasury. It was decided to keep the annual dues at \$6.00 per year, with additional funds being raised as needed by an assessment or fund-raising activities if the cost of printing and mailing the newsletters began to deplete the treasury. The opinion of the alumni was that the newsletters were valuable, particularly in sharing current news about alumni, and that this should be continued rather than curtailed.

Frank Czajkowski, '53, put forth a resolution urging a vote of confidence in the current officers by continuing their term of office through the 1981 meeting. There was no opposition to this and the resolution was approved unanimously. Because of reservations expressed by Reggie Stanczyk, '67, Secretary-Treasurer, concerning the time-consuming nature of the work involved in the newsletter, dues collection, and mailing lists, it was re-affirmed that the officers were authorized to appoint committees to assist in this work and in the preparations for alumni reunions.

A discussion was held on the question of whether or not it was good to continue holding the reunions in October. Many alumni who could not attend the reunion had written to urge a summer date. Frank Czajkowski suggested the second weekend in August: There was some reservation about this date because it appears to conflict with a newly established race in Watkins Glen. Approval was given, however, to holding the 1980 reunion during the summer on a trial basis. Attendance at the summer reunion would determine future reunion dates. The specific date of the 1980 reunion will be announced in the next newsletter. Alumni are urged to write to the Secretary concerning their preference for a June, July, or August date. In addition, the alumni expressed a desire to continue centering alumni activities at the Padua complex for the time being.

There was some discussion on the "metro-alumni". Because of the large number of alumni in the metropolitan area, there is some desire to hold an activity during the year for the benefit of these alumni. The question was raised as to the role of Tom Wojslawowicz, '60, Vice-President, who had been elected to represent the metro-alumni. Because he was not present at the reunion and there had been no contact with him during the year, Tom Malina, '66, President, was given the task of contacting Mr. Wojslawowicz to determine what activities might be arranged for the metro-alumni. John LaSalle, '62, offered to make arrangements for a cocktail party to be held at the New York Athletic Club in Manhattan. Although the suggestion was well-received, it was decided to wait on this pending contact with Mr. Wojslawowicz.

The alumni were honored to have Mr. Mark Denton give a slide presentation at the meeting. Mr. Denton is a consulting architect for a firm preparing development plans for Watkins Glen. The presentation was entitled "Watkins Glen - Tomorrow", and served as a prelude to discussion about the uses of Padua.

Fr. Austin gave a brief presentation on his plans for a "new Padua", which center on establishing an educational community for adults. Concern was expressed by alumni as to what their role might be in the development of plans for Padua. Frank Czajkowski, '53, and others spoke emotionally of the great love alumni have for Padua and the desire they have to see a school re-established there. Because of the complexities of the issue and the fact that alumni get together only once a year, there could be no clear-cut decisions made as to what should take place. Fr. Austin has permission from the Provincial Board to put together a more concrete plan concerning his ideas and will be pursuing this goal. Alumni who are interested in Padua's development would need to either contact him about their ideas and possible involvement or get together on their own to formulate an "alumni proposal".

The meeting was ended at this time in order to prepare for the alumni Mass.


## Gentlemen:



### FATHER JOHN ARRIVES IN NEW GUINEA

As we reported in the last issue of <u>The Paduan</u>, Fr. John Liczner O.F.M., Class of '57, received permission to begin work as a missionary in Papua. New Guinea. Fr. John sent a letter in November describing his journey from the U.S. to Japan to Hong Kong, to Manila, to Australia, and finally New Guinea. Part of his letter is printed here and Paduans who know Fr. John (and even those who don't) might like to write a note to him to let him know we are thinking about him:

Rev. John Liczner, O.F.M. Catholic Mission Aitape, W.S.P. Papua, New Guinea

Dear Reggie,

It's a long way from home here to Aitape, Papua New Guinea (PNG) but it's also a fulfillment of my plans and desire of the past two years to serve people in a foreign land. It was two years ago that I got the idea of going to PNG as a missionary after reading an item in the Provincial News stating that volunteers were needed for this part of the world. Up to that time I didn't even know where PNG was. It wasn't however a sudden decision because I always had a dream of mission work and maybe this was the right time to make that big step. After ten years of formation work which, by the way, I enjoyed very much because I learned so much and stayed young while doing it, I needed a radical change and I don't think I could do much better than to take off to the bush of PNG. My provincial superior and his board gave me the go ahead sign last April and I was able to make preparations in earnest for the big move. The support which I received from my brothers in the Novitiate as well as the whole provincial community was very gratifying and I know I can count on their backing and prayerful support. The same was true of my parents and family and friends. They didn't show too much shock or surprise after I explained to them that it was something that I had to volunteer and that no one was assigning me to this work. The parting was very difficult and in some cases full of tears. The departure ceremony in Burlington Friary was just another occasion for thanksgiving to God for giving me such brothers in the Franciscan Order and friends who supported me in this new adventure. I thank you for your encouragement and your gifts and above all, your love ... (Ed. note: Fr. John goes on to describe his trip. He's now in Australia,) At another place later on I had an opportunity to feed the kangaroos and hold a loala in my arms for a photo. In Brisbane I went to the Gold Coast, a resort area similar to Florida, where I enjoyed a dip in the salt water of the ocean and jogged for miles along the white sand beach. But the biggest event in Sydney and Brisbane was meeting some people whom I knew while in a refugee camp in Germany. It was wonderful to meet them after 30 yrs.: not much time needed to get reacquainted. All of them were so generous and hospitable that I put on several pounds after a frequent round of food and drink. I tried to rationalize this by saying that I won't be getting this kind of food in PNG so might as well store it up for the future.... I am here in Aitape for a week and by next week I will be moving into the bush to get to know real mission work in different stations and to learn the language. But I will leave that story for the next installment. So far I like it here and am adjusting quite well to everything .... God bless and love you all. I thought you might be interested in knowing that I made it to Papua, New Guinea. It looks like its going to be an adventure. Fell free to circulate this or quote it in the newsletter. And write -
